We are the flag bearers of such an incredible civilization in which a ruler sent an army thousands of miles away to establish justice and apprehend the culprits when he learnt that a solitary woman's modesty was defiled; a legacy wherein a teenaged companion of the prophet subjected himself to weeks of weeping in the wilderness before breathing his last simply because his sight momentarily lingered on something that a morally upright Muslim shouldn't set his eyes upon.

We are the inheritors of such a wonderful civilization of justice, equality & balanced social welfare wherein the rightly guided governors were very much duty conscious and mindful of their responsibility towards the poor and the orphans and facilitated the rise of even slaves to positions of prominence in the state as well as become eminent scholars of their era. So much so that for probably the only time in history the world saw a society in which people were willing to give zakat but struggled to find any deserving takers. Such an egalitarian civilization which represents the pinnacle of the art of living, naturally spread to distant lands at a startling pace; be it through businessmen landing on the shores of Malabar and the far eastern countries or scholars & saints who displayed remarkable nobility & integrity of character.

The question that we should ask ourselves is that which society is more balanced, healthy & successful in terms of happier citizens? The society in which slaves rose to become kings & there were no takers of zakat i.e. there were no poor left, but the technology in those days was rudimentary at best. Or our current society wherein technology is at its zenith with AI & robotics however there are millions on anti-depressant pills & millions born out of wed lock & millions under the poverty line?

Often when a school is projected as an advanced school, its robotics lab & computer lab and science projects are highlighted. So is science the only panacea for all ills? Do societies only get transformed with science & technology? Moreover, how much can we really Islamize S = D/T & F = MxA? Also, we teach complicated problems & theorems of geometry which 80% of the students will barely use in their further studies or in their lives.

But we do not teach them economics from the perspective of why and how is riba a cancer & what alternatives does Islam give us. We do not teach them civics from the perspective of the more effective alternatives that Islam presents in the domain of administration. We often in our schools teach economics & civics as is, without giving it ghusl. We as is teach the govt. mandated doctored and merely chronological narrative of events in History rather than researching & teaching the alternative narrative of history in an applicable lesson oriented way. Very few Islamic schools conduct regular social campaigns to sensitize students about the various issues plaguing the world. Even the core Islamiyat studies often times is bereft of creativity based on child psychology & is often merely a compilation of a few duas and Nazra of Quran. It is often bereft of Seerah & Islamic history from the applicable lesson perspective.

We need to consciously try to Islamize the subjects connected to humanities as well. In our industry oriented education system the entire focus seems to be on Math & Science. But engineers in the larger frame of reference mostly end up becoming a cog among a million other cogs in the grand machine of the world whose script is determined by those who do not necessarily consider Islam as a solution for mankind. Ofcourse utilizing technology as a source of power to influence this script and direct it towards Islamic goals is of paramount importance. This can never be contested. The case of the shunning of the printing press by the Ottomans & its historical impact on a global scale is most certainly a compelling lesson for generations to come. Although it is an effective tool, however, science & technology cannot be an end in itself.

The bedrock of the transformative vision of Allama Iqbal to build a society based on Islamic principles in every aspect of individual & collective life is education itself. Religion thus is not merely a set of no doubt important rituals and individual morality but it also provides a framework of holistic societal reform. This spirit should percolate in every aspect of the school ecosystem. So that the products of such schools will be able to create an awareness of Islam as a spiritual, moral, social, economic & administrative solution to the problems of mankind. And wherever possible to whatever extent implement the solutions presented by Islam.

The remarkable legacy of our past in which the world witnessed the pinnacle of civilization itself was built on the bedrock of faith and absolute values. Values which were so remarkably epitomized by Prophet Muhammad (s.a.w.). Infact many historians today consider the revolution brought about by our beloved Prophet (saw) to be the critical axis of Historical periodization. Some of the traits he showed for the world to follow were, that:

- 1. He had the milk of human kindness. He could not see anyone suffering in any way, even though he himself use to tie stones on his stomach to thwart the pangs of hunger. Whenever the prophet received gifts and provision for the future he gave it to the poor and the needy and never kept it back for himself.
- 2. He was far from being a person who wants power, status, leadership and glory & wears expensive clothes & lives in big mansions with several guards etc. Our beloved Prophet Muhammad (may peace be upon him) on the contrary milked his own goat, mended his own clothes, repaired his own shoes & even cleaned his own home with a broom. He was an amazing model of simplicity and humbleness. He sat on the floor & dined with the poor.
- 3. He eradicated all differences of class, race and color & taught us the value of piety. He said, "Nearest and dearest to me are those who possess the virtue of piety no matter what race or nationality they belong to or which country they live in."
- 4. He taught us that, "He is not of us who is not affectionate to those who are younger than himself and respect those who are older." He said, "In the pleasure of parents lies the pleasure of God, and in their displeasure, the displeasure of God." Thus there is no need for old age homes in Islam.
- 5. Our beloved prophet said, "The signs of a hypocrite are three: when he speaks, he is untrue; when he promises, he fails; and when he is trusted, he breaks the trust." Islam is against all corrupt means of making money, such as, dishonest trading, embezzlement, gambling, speculation, deceit, usury, hoarding, wrongful litigation and bribery. Muhammad (saw) warned that, "He who obtains the property of another by swearing a false oath will appear as a leper before God (on the Day of Judgment).
- 6. He taught us to be courteous in our behaviour towards our neighbour. He said, "He is not a Muslim who eats his fill and lets his neighbour go hungry." He also said, "He shall not go to Heaven from whose mischief his neighbour does not feel secure."
- 7. It is narrated that once the Prophet (peace be upon him) joined two of his fingers and showing them to the Companions said, "He who supports an orphan shall be as close to me in Heaven as are these fingers to each-other."
- 8. He also declared that,: "He who endeavours to relieve the widow, the depressed and the needy is as one who strives in the service of God, and, in Divine reward, he is like the one who permanently fasts during the day and spends his nights in prayers."
- 9. He said, "Feed the hungry, visit the sick and free the captives." No distinction has been drawn in this tradition of the Prophet (peace be upon him) between a Muslim and a non-Muslim.
- 10. To feel pity on a fellow human being in distress, to be compassionately drawn towards him, to support him, to pardon the guilty and the defaulter are virtues which are valued very highly in Islam. The Prophet said, "Show kindness, and kindness will be shown to you; forgive, and you will be forgiven." He said, "God will hold back His punishment from him who will hold back his anger." He even declared that speaking politely & even smiling is a kind of charity.

- 11. The Prophet (s.a.w.) even taught us that, "The Earth is green and beautiful, and Allah has appointed you as stewards over it". He said that even if it is the last day of the world one should continue with plantation. He also said, "Cleanliness is half of faith."
- 12. He taught us to repent & feel genuinely sorry and ashamed of the sins that one may commit and resolve sincerely not to do so again, and seek the forgiveness of God with all his heart.
- 13. Humility is a virtue Islam wants its followers to practice as a distinguishing feature of their moral and spiritual behaviour. The Prophet (saw) said, "Whoever has pride in his heart even to the weight of a mustard seed, shall not enter Paradise."
- 14. He said, "Do not bear a grudge or enmity against each other, do not be jealous of each-other, and do not indulge in backbiting."
- 15. He taught us forgiveness by forgiving the man who killed his beloved uncle, he even forgave the woman whose hatred towards Muhammad (saw) was so severe that she desecrated the body of his beloved uncle Hamza (ra). Infact when the Muslims entered Makkah victorious he declared that no man or woman shall be harmed this day.
- 16. No wonder Micheal Hart in his book The 100 most influential people of the world declares him to be the most complete individual ever & the most influential. He was the best husband, a wonderful father, the most reliable friend, the most honest businessman, the greatest teacher, the finest statesman, the most balanced judge, an astute military strategist & general and the wisest spiritual master, all rolled into one.

It is a grave misfortune of the human civilization that we have come a long way from our glorious past. We have lost the spirit of rational enquiry & scholastic brilliance which illuminated the world as well as we have abandoned the spiritual essence & the zeal for social welfare which for several centuries enlightened all of humanity. Consequently, mankind today is witnessing widespread destitution & impoverishment along with moral turpitude, ubiquitous depravity, malnutrition, pollution, ecological imbalance, deprivation, economic disparity, materialism, scholastic mediocrity, intolerance, sectarianism, social discrimination, strife, ideological & racial conflicts like never before.

Infact in the age of our fore-fathers life was simple and there was far greater tranquility and peace.
